April 2024 Featured Hymn: This month our featured hymn is "Who Are You Who Walk in Sorrow," (LSB 476). Pastor Herman Stuempfle was asked to write this hymn in 2001 on the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus by the National Association of Pastoral Musicians, a Roman Catholic group. As he retells the Emmaus story, Christ Himself is actively present with His Word, and the singer is led to recognize and receive the risen Lord in Holy Communion. The narrative of the hymn moves from the biblical past to the present and then to the future. It opens with the mourning of death and ends with the hope of the resurrection and the life everlasting. Acts 4:1–12 1 John 3:16–24 John 10:11–18

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, Lays Down His Life for the Sheep

The Lord Jesus is "the good shepherd" who "lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). His life is not taken from Him, but He lays it down willingly, of His own accord, because He knows and loves the sheep. As the One sent by the Father, He has the "authority to lay it down" and the "authority to take it up again" (John 10:18). So has He done, and now He continues to love and serve as the Good Shepherd of the sheep by the voice of His Gospel. He thus calls all people into the fold of His Church, so that there may be "one flock, one shepherd" (John 10:16). That is why the apostles "were teaching the people and proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection from the dead" (Acts 4:2). Since "there is salvation in no one else," His voice rings out to this day through the preaching of His name, "for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). His voice comforts our hearts against all condemnation and gives us courage to "love one another" and "to lay down our lives for the brothers," as He laid down His life for us (1 John 3:16,
